Benin

Policy: Benin offers visa-free entry to citizens of all African Union member states for stays up to 90 days.

Entry Process: African travelers can enter The Gambia without a visa. Upon arrival and departure at the airport, a security fee of \$20 (or equivalent in euros or dalasi) is payable in cash at designated kiosks. [Emerging Brand Africa](#)

Rwanda

Policy: Rwanda grants visa-free entry to all African nationals, promoting free movement and trade within the continent.

Entry Process: African travelers receive a visa upon arrival at Kigali International Airport or any land border. Citizens of African Union member states are exempt from visa fees for visits up to 30 days. East African Community (EAC) citizens are granted a pass/entry visa free of charge upon arrival, valid for six months.

Seychelles

Policy: Seychelles provides visa-free access to all foreign nationals, including Africans.

Entry Process: Visitors must obtain a Visitor's Permit on arrival, issued free of charge and initially valid for up to three months. Extensions are available for a fee, not exceeding a total stay of twelve months. Travelers should possess a valid passport, return or onward ticket, proof of accommodation, and sufficient funds.

Ghana

Policy: Effective January 6, 2025, Ghana allows visa-free entry for all African nationals, aligning with its commitment to the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

Entry Process: African travelers can enter Ghana without a visa. Previously, Ghana granted visa-free entry to citizens of 26 African nations and visas on arrival to travelers from 25 others. This new policy eliminates visa requirements for all African nationals, facilitating easier movement across the continent.

Strategic Importance of Visa Liberalization

Visa liberalization is not merely a matter of convenience; it is a strategic imperative for Africa's economic and social development. The African Union's Agenda 2063 and the AfCFTA aim to create a single market for goods, services, and labor. Facilitating free movement is essential for achieving these goals, as it enables labor mobility, enhances tourism, and fosters cultural exchange.

Moreover, increased mobility can lead to a significant boost in intra-African trade, which currently accounts for only 13% of the continent's total trade. By reducing travel restrictions, African nations can unlock new economic opportunities and strengthen regional ties.
